

The ranch style, brick home was built in 1979 and was the third presidents house built since 1908. This house has been occupied by three former CSC Presidents Carl O. Westbrook, Ronald Garner, and Donnie L. Nero and their families.

Black & Blues: Black History Month Celebrates the Blues

For over 30 years the United States has observed February as Black History Month. In recognition of this month, Connors State College Library display is titled, “Black & Blues: Black History Month Celebrates the Blues - Featuring the Oklahoma Blues Hall of Fame.” The library will showcase this by featuring D.C. and Selby Minner. D.C. was an American Blues Musician born just down the road from Warner in Rentiesville, Oklahoma. Minner literally grew up in his mom’s juke joint in Rentiesville. He eventually went on to own the ‘Down Home Blues Club’ in Rentiesville, and in 1991 he and his wife Selby started a blues festival called “Dusk til Dawn Blues Festival.” His accomplishments far exceeded outside of Rentiesville. Founding the Oklahoma Blues Hall of Fame was one of his greatest achievements. He also went on to win awards such as, being inducted in the Oklahoma Jazz hall of Fame in 1999, voted into the Oklahoma Music Hall of Fame and earning an international award for their work with kids, known as BITS (Blues in the School). D.C. passed away 3 years ago, but Selby carries on the tradition though her work with Oklahoma Arts Council and continues to host the annual “Dusk til Dawn Blues Festival” every year.

The showcase will be on display through the month of March. Come explore this wonderful piece of history and talented musician.



Both of them are Connors State Alumni and both have dedicated their time and knowledge to the Agriculture Equine and Rodeo Program.

Jake Lawson first came to Connors in 1995 from Haskell, Oklahoma. He was a freshman interested in the Agricultural Equine program. After graduating with an Associates of Science degree in 1997 Lawson headed to OSU to continue his education. A year after his departure the rodeo program was introduced and former instructor/coach Fred Williams was put in charge. “Fred called me about a potential job. I thought the opportunity was something that I could not pass up, so I took the job, transferred to NSU and continued as a full time student as well as working full as an assistant with the Rodeo Team,” said Lawson. Lawson brings an impressive resume to Connors. A few of his personal accomplishments include a National Championship, ABHA Reserve World Champion, master’s degree in College Teaching, and over a decade of experience in training horses.

Lawson always wanted the opportunity to return to CSC one day, “I benefited tremendously from the CSC Equine program as a student, and I wanted the opportunity to give back some of the knowledge and experiences that I have obtained.”

Jake Walker attended Connors for the first time in 2001. After growing up in the large school district of Broken Arrow, Walker was excited to be coming to a small town college. On his first visit to the campus, he met with Jake Lawson and after a brief meeting he knew this was the place for him and went to enroll. Nearly a decade after graduating from Connors, Walker obtained his Bachelors of Science and Masters of Education while continuing to build his resume with experiences that will directly benefit his career as an Equine Instructor and Rodeo Coach. Walker returned to the Division of Agriculture in 2007 as an instructor and with the retirement of Fred Williams in 2009, became the assistant Rodeo Coach under the direction of Jake Lawson.

While dedicating lots of hours with their students and the Agriculture Program, the Jakes both enjoy spending time with their wonderful families, roping, and playing music.

Every TEAM looks for a Leader

Every basketball team is looking for a leader, someone who can start and ignite an offense an individual who inspires a team to play its best. Sophomore Jared Harrison is that type of individual for the Connors State Cowboys. The sophomore from Slidel, La., is the only returning starter back from a team a year ago that posted a 26-4 record and fell short of its goal to reach the NJCAA National Tournament in Hutchinson, Kan.

Harrison, who came to the Warner, campus on the recommendation of a Florida International University assistant, has only one thought on his mind, get to the national tournament. "The assistant coach at FIU told me about how Connors was a great school and how I would fit in here," said Harrison. "I gave it a shot and everything has worked out." Harrison, who did not immediately attend school following his high school graduation, worked for a year in Mississippi, stayed in shaped for basketball and got the recommendation from the FIU assistant. CSC head coach Bill Muse said that recommendation has paid dividends for his Cowboys. "Jared is a pure winner a pure point-guard," said Muse. "He makes everyone around him a better player and team player. He has been our leader that past couple of years."

Harrison said he's glad he made the move to come to Warner, "This school is everything I wanted," said Harrison. "I wanted to concentrate on school and play basketball. My freshman year was okay. I started and we were ranked No. 1 at one point in the year. We had a great a team, but we didn't reach our goal. We lost that game (Region II Tournament) and I cried my eyes out. There were so many expectations for us and we came up short. It hurt my heart. That's why I have so much motivation to get back there."

Harrison, who hasn't committed to a school to continue his basketball career, said he doesn't feel any added pressure as the only returning starter, "I have to play regardless. I don't feel any pressure. I look at it as doing the same thing every day. I play basketball every day, as long as I can remember. It's really comfortable out here, rather than pressure," said Harrison.

The point-guard said the Cowboys have slowly come together this season. "We have developed team chemistry. I believe we have been doing pretty well. We can be just as good as last year's team," said Harrison.

He said one of the things that was disappointing this season was the end of the 43-game home court winning streak. "I've been a part of that streak and it was very disappointing (losing to No. 13-ranked Eastern State) because they were a ranked team. It was very disappointing to lose. But I want to turn it around on them when we go down there. We can't wait to get there on their home court," said Harrison.

The Cowboys have won the Oklahoma Collegiate Athletic Conference two consecutive seasons and Harrison expects more of the same. "Our expectations are high. We have enough losses right now to know we have to come out every night and play. Nothing is going to be handed to us. We are the defending conference champions and guys want to beat us. We have targets on our backs every night.

"We want to get back to the conference championship, win regional and get to the national tournament. That's our goal," said Harrison.

Another goal for Harrison is moving on to a Division I school. Harrison said he is wide open and is looking for the best fit. Muse agrees.

"He's definitely a Division I player. Every time someone comes to the school to look at us they see him and ask for his number or about him," said Muse. "He makes our team so much better."

Leading by Example

One of the very first photos ever taken at Connors was a picture of the campus farm in 1912. Since the early 1900's many programs have come and gone, but the farm has always been a permanent fixture. With two farms, 1700 acres, and 350 animals the care and preparation is not a typical nine to five job.

Given that animals don't take the day off, our staff members work 365 days a year and up to 12 hour shifts. Blake Nelson has been the farm manager for the past 8 years. A small group of farm staff are responsible for the day to day operations and the professional exhibition and marketing of our cattle.

Recently, the Connors State College Farm Show Team packed up all their hard work and traveled south to Fort Worth to compete against 50 exhibitors in the National Santa Gertrudis show. Director of Farm Operations, Blake Nelson said, "The national show gives our team the opportunity to exhibit the hard work that is done daily. Our team was up against other ranchers from across the United States and our team walked away with a top honor known as the Herdsman Award." CSC was selected by the Superintendent of the Southwest Livestock Exhibition. Teams are judged based on the cleanness and professionalism of their show area. This was the first time that CSC has earned this award. The team was made up of staff members, Dale Pitchford and Roger Martin. Agriculture students, Josh Walton and Clay Carlson joined the staff members at this competition. "We believe it is important to surround our students with staff and faculty who lead by example. Our farm staff exemplifies the qualities that are needed to be successful in the farming and showing industry and we want our students to leave here with those same qualities." Connors State College currently has over 130 students studying agriculture from majors such as Agriculture Communication to Equine Science.

Success did not stop at the Herdsman Award. Other show highlights included a Star Five Category class winner by our Heifer, Olivia and a couple 2nd place finishes.



Tobacco-Free Campus

In Oklahoma the prevalence of cigarette smoking among adults (18+ years and older) is astounding at nearly 25%, ranking Oklahoma 47th in the U.S according to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention. Today, smoking is the number one cause of death in Oklahoma. Due to this health epidemic and the harmful effects of tobacco, Oklahoma Governor, Mary Fallin announced at her State of the State address that she has signed an executive order banning all tobacco on all state-owned and state leased properties, in state-owned and leased buildings and vehicles. The new ban will go into effect July 1, 2012. Connors State College will fall under this new regulation set forth by the Governor. President of Connors State

College, Dr. Tim Faltyn said, "We are going to start taking steps towards becoming a tobacco-free campus now so the transition will be as smooth as possible in July. We plan to offer classes and programs to help people in tobacco cessation. We want to support people as much as possible. I believe the transition might be difficult for some, but our campus satisfaction survey showed us that 78% of our students, staff and faculty who took the survey preferred a tobacco free campus. In the end, the Governor's decision has the potential to make our campus a healthier place." Studies have shown that non-smokers are more productive and have less sick days. In a study published by CNN, findings showed that smokers took an average of 11 more sick days than non-smokers. These days, employers nationwide are starting to implement smoke-free policies. According to a 2000 Gallup poll, 95 percent of Americans, smokers and non-smokers, now believe companies should either ban smoking totally in the workplace or restrict it to separately ventilated areas.

The harmful effects of smoking far exceed just an unattractive smell. Smoking harms nearly every organ in the body and accounts for nearly 443,000 deaths each year in the United States. Anyone who has tried to quit smoking can attest to the fact that it is tough. But even if it is tough, the benefits of quitting smoking start right away. Medical experts have found that a person's health improves minutes after taking their last puff and continues in the years to

Connors State College Rodeo Alumni Paul Bogart has been busy since he left Warner. The Oologah native was a standout on the Connors Rodeo Team and was voted Mr. Connors State College. In 2003 he graduated with a degree in Business Administration and continued his studies at Rogers State College. He continues to be active in the American Quarter Horse Association, and has won World Championship Titles.

Today, however, you might better know him for his country music career as a singer/ songwriter. He played gigs around the state during his time at Connors, and later at Rogers State University, all while continuing to pursue his love for roping. It was after graduation from Rogers State that he took the final step in music and moved to Nashville. Paul released his first album, Making Hay, in 2008 and followed it up in 2010 with The Ride. When not touring, he spends much of his time writing with some of the great country song writers.
